NEW SUPPORT GROUP FOR LYMPHOMA PATIENTS AND CAREGIVERS

Public healthcare institutions and non-government organisations collaborate to launch a new support group as Singapore observes its first World Lymphoma Awareness Day

SINGAPORE - According to the Singapore Cancer Registry, between 2010 and 2014, lymphoid neoplasms or lymphoma was the fifth and sixth most commonly occurring cancer in Singaporean men and women respectively¹. During the same period, over 3,400 Singaporeans were diagnosed with the disease.

As cancer patients, survivors and their families will tell you, being diagnosed with cancer is a life-changing event. From the point of diagnosis, many patients and even their loved ones experience feelings of shock, anger, fear, denial and a myriad of other emotions. Understandably, these emotions can be very difficult to deal with. The cancer journey is certainly not easy for anyone.

Support groups have come to play a very important role, especially in helping newly diagnosed patients and their families. Such groups are a key source of information and comfort, enabling anyone affected by cancer to come together to share common concerns and experiences. Besides lending a listening ear, members of such groups have also been known to become pillars of support and encouragement for one another. "Many of our patients have told us that speaking to someone who has "been there and done that" definitely makes their journey less daunting and uncertain," said Dr Michelle Poon, Chairman of the Lymphoma Cancer Awareness Organising Committee 2015 and Consultant, Department of Haematology-Oncology, National University Cancer Institute, Singapore (NCIS).

Ms Erma Maulood, who was diagnosed with Stage 2 Non-Hodgkin Lymphoma (NHL), had her fears and reservations, having seen her friend with cancer suffer during treatment. "Fortunately, not only do I have the support of my family and loved ones, I also found comfort and hope in The Lymphoma Club after reading about other lymphoma patients' journeys and how they overcame the disease. I also sought solace in patients in the same ward and as much as possible, tried to befriend them and rally a positive state of mind." NHL is a type of blood cancer that starts in cells called lymphocytes, which are part of the body's immune system.

Building on the present patient support network of the Leukemia and Lymphoma Foundation (LLF), the NCIS, the National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS), the

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Singapore General Hospital (SGH) and the Singapore Cancer Society (SCS) have come together in collaboration to launch a support group for lymphoma patients, survivors and their families across Singapore. The objectives are to help patients and survivors share their experiences of battling the disease and to lend support to one another through the difficult journey.

Led by LLF and supported by the various partners, such a support group, will hopefully be able to achieve these objectives through not just formal events, but also informal activities and regular gatherings for both patients and their families. These will include weekly walks, bowling sessions and visits to some of the attractions such as the Zoological Gardens, Universal Studios and Gardens by the Bay.

This lymphoma support group will be officially launched on 26 September 2015 at the multilingual public symposium on lymphoma, held in conjunction with the World Lymphoma Awareness Day (WLAD). WLAD is a day dedicated to raising awareness of lymphoma, and is commemorated internationally on 15 September annually. This will be the first year that WLAD is observed in Singapore in order to raise public awareness about lymphoma.

The public symposium will cover topics such as the risks of getting lymphoma, the signs and symptoms of the cancer, treatment options and more. Not only do we aim to raise awareness of this disease, we also hope to better equip the public with knowledge about the disease so that symptoms can be detected as early as possible. This can lead to early diagnosis and treatment, thus enabling a better chance of recovery for the patients.
