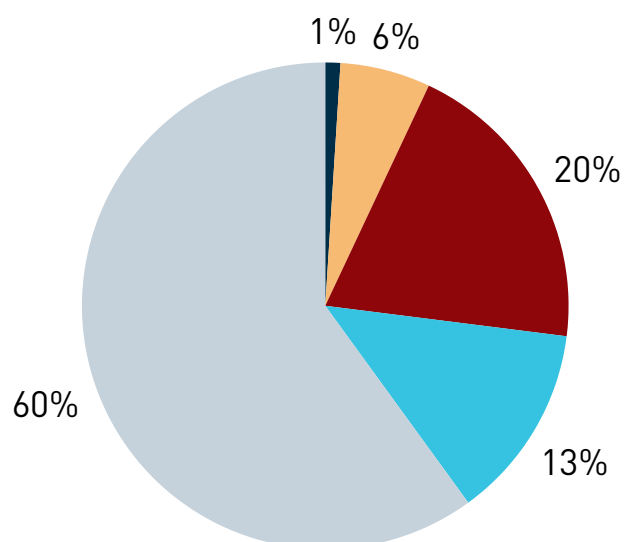

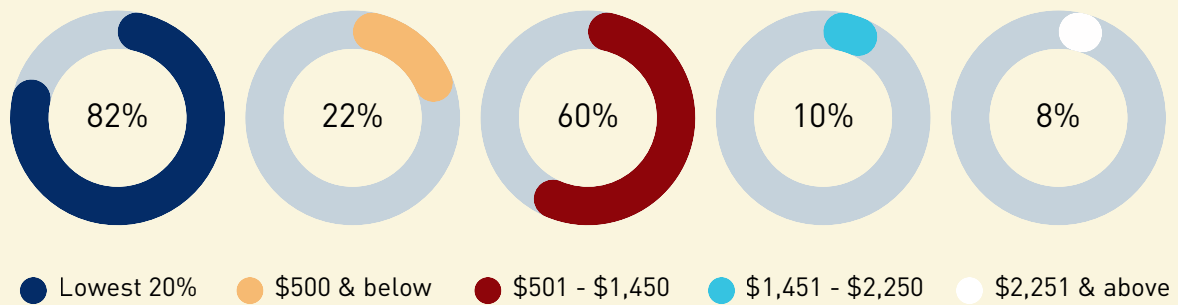

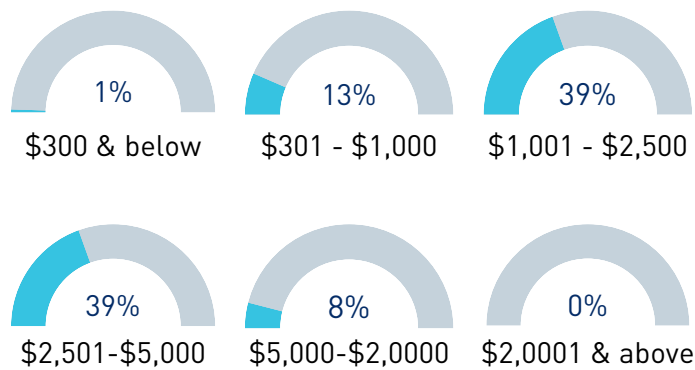


Per Capita Income (by application data)

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Finding strength through every challenge

How donor support helped Norhidaya focus on healing and hope

For years, uncertainty was a constant companion for Norhidaya Binte Bujang.

Her health challenges began more than ten years ago when she experienced repeated episodes of pneumothorax, or collapsed lung, caused by Langerhans Cell Histiocytosis (LCH), a rare disease that affected her lungs. Living with the condition meant never knowing when the next episode might strike. Repeated hospital visits and the unpredictability of her condition took a physical and emotional toll.

When doctors recommended chemotherapy, Norhidaya struggled to come to terms with the treatment. Fear and uncertainty about its impact on her future led her to delay treatment for several years.

Following another pneumothorax episode, she decided it was time to take the difficult step of starting chemotherapy. Norhidaya underwent intravenous chemotherapy, followed by oral chemotherapy medication for several years. Throughout treatment, she drew strength from her family and from within.

"I kept telling myself, 'I can do this. I can get through this,'" she recalled.

Alongside the challenges of treatment came financial stress. Medical and everyday living expenses continued even as she focused on her health.

Support from the NCIS Cancer Fund helped ease some of the burden, giving Norhidaya peace of mind and allowing her to focus more fully on treatment and recovery.

For Norhidaya, the support extended beyond financial assistance. She said, "Knowing that someone is willing to help gives you hope. It makes you feel that there are people who care about what you are going through."

Today, Norhidaya's condition is stable, and she continues regular follow-up care with her medical team at NCIS. Looking back, she reflects not only on the challenges she endured, but also the resilience she discovered along the way.

Research Today. Better Cancer Care Tomorrow.

With donor support, NCIS researchers are advancing discoveries that have the potential to improve how cancer is detected, treated and managed — bringing hope to patients in Singapore and around the world.

Investigating the oncogenic role of AKR1C3 in lung squamous cell carcinoma

For patients diagnosed with lung squamous cell carcinoma, treatment options remain limited and outcomes can be uncertain. To improve the future of lung cancer care, researchers are investigating a protein known as Aldo-Keto Reductase Family 1 Member C3 (AKR1C3), which is found at higher levels in many lung squamous cell tumours and may play a role in helping cancer cells grow, spread, and resist treatment.

This research seeks to understand how AKR1C3 contributes to the development and progression of lung cancer. By studying tumour samples and cancer cells in the laboratory, the team aims to uncover the biological mechanisms that drive the disease and identify new ways to stop cancer growth. The study will also explore whether targeting AKR1C3 could help make existing treatments more effective.

The ultimate goal is to translate these discoveries into better care for patients — enabling earlier intervention, more targeted therapies, and improved survival outcomes. Every breakthrough brings us a step closer to a future where lung cancer is detected earlier, treated more precisely, and associated with better quality of life for patients and their families.

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Donor support makes this work possible, helping researchers pursue innovative discoveries that may one day lead to new treatment options and renewed hope for those affected by lung cancer.

Advancing treatment for lung cancer patients with brain metastases

For patients with advanced lung cancer, the spread of cancer to the brain can have a profound impact on quality of life and treatment outcomes.

To address this challenge, NCIS researchers led by Dr Soon Yu Yang undertook the OUTRUN clinical trial, which contributed to the landmark STARLET study — the first international randomised trial to evaluate whether targeted brain radiation should be used alongside a modern targeted therapy called osimertinib for patients with Epidermal Growth Factor Receptor (EGFR)-mutant non-small cell lung cancer and brain metastases.

The study brought together researchers and patients from Singapore, Australia and Canada, comparing outcomes between patients who received osimertinib alone and those who

received a combination of stereotactic radiosurgery and osimertinib.

The findings showed that many patients with small, minimally symptomatic brain metastases could achieve effective disease control with osimertinib alone, sparing them from additional treatment and potential side effects without compromising outcomes.

Published in the *Journal of Thoracic Oncology*, the study provides the first prospective randomised evidence supporting this treatment approach and is expected to help guide clinical decision-making worldwide.

The research highlights how sustained support for cancer research enables NCIS scientists to generate evidence that can improve care, quality of life and treatment options for patients in Singapore and beyond.

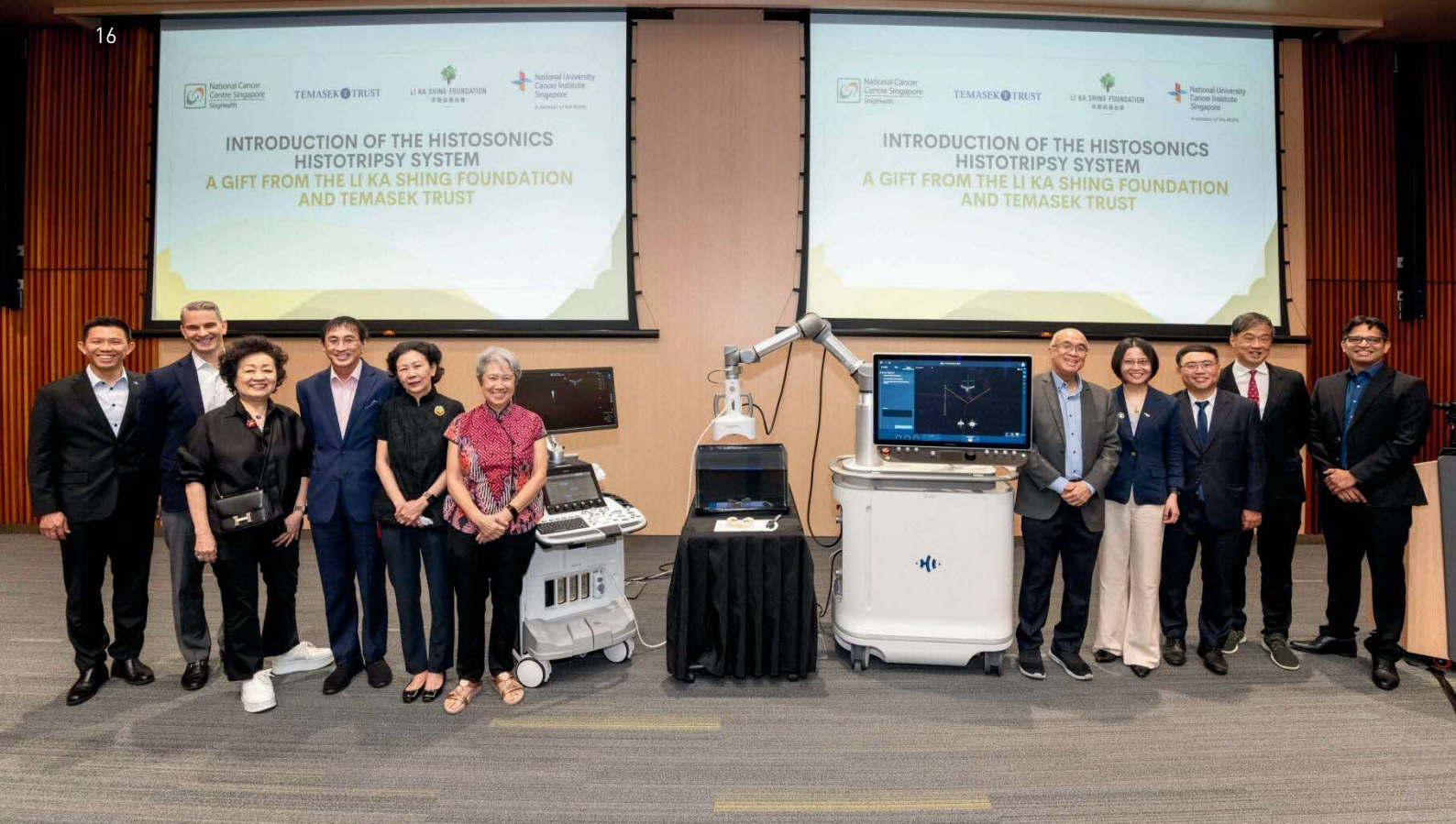
For many families, this support provides much-needed relief during an already difficult period, offering not only practical assistance but also hope and reassurance that they are not facing their cancer journey alone.

Transforming cancer care through innovation

For patients with liver, kidney and pancreatic cancers, treatment options can be limited — particularly when tumours are difficult to access or surgery is not possible.

A landmark gift from the Li Ka Shing Foundation (LKSF) and Temasek Trust (TT) is helping to change that, bringing a groundbreaking new cancer treatment to Singapore and offering new hope to patients across the region.

In April 2025, LKSF and TT committed S\$12 million to introduce histotripsy, an innovative non-invasive cancer therapy that uses focused ultrasound waves to destroy tumours at the cellular level without surgery, radiation or heat.

The gift funds two histotripsy systems — the first in Southeast Asia — with one system deployed at NCIS and the other at the National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS). It also supports clinical trials for patients with liver, kidney and pancreatic cancers, advancing cancer research and innovation in Singapore.

Histotripsy uses focused ultrasound to generate microscopic bubbles that rapidly expand and collapse, creating shock waves that break down tumour tissue while preserving surrounding structures. The technology has the potential to create new treatment possibilities for patients who may not be suitable for conventional approaches.

The gift enables NCIS clinicians and researchers to evaluate histotripsy's effectiveness in a Southeast Asian population and build evidence for its future use.

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We at TTFA are delighted to have the Li Ka Shing Foundation and Temasek Trust come together to catalyse this important initiative, to study this innovative non-invasive ultrasound-based cancer therapy in Southeast Asia. We are privileged to work alongside NCCS and NCIS to support clinical research and trials to use this novel modality that targets important cancers.

Scheduled to open in early 2027, the enhanced

garden will extend the impact of the NCIS Wellbeing Centre, which opened in 2025 on level 8 in the NUH Medical Centre, to provide holistic support services for patients and caregivers.

Inspired by growing evidence on the healing benefits of nature and designed with accessibility and inclusivity in mind, the garden will serve as a welcoming space for activities that promote mindfulness, emotional resilience, rehabilitation and meaningful social connection for patients and caregivers.

More than a garden, this gift represents a lasting investment in compassionate, person-centred cancer care. It will help ensure that future generations of patients and caregivers have access to a restorative environment that nurtures healing, hope and wellbeing beyond the walls of the hospital.

Through shared stories and experiences, the event shone a spotlight on progress in pancreatic cancer care and research while inspiring continued collaboration to improve patient outcomes.

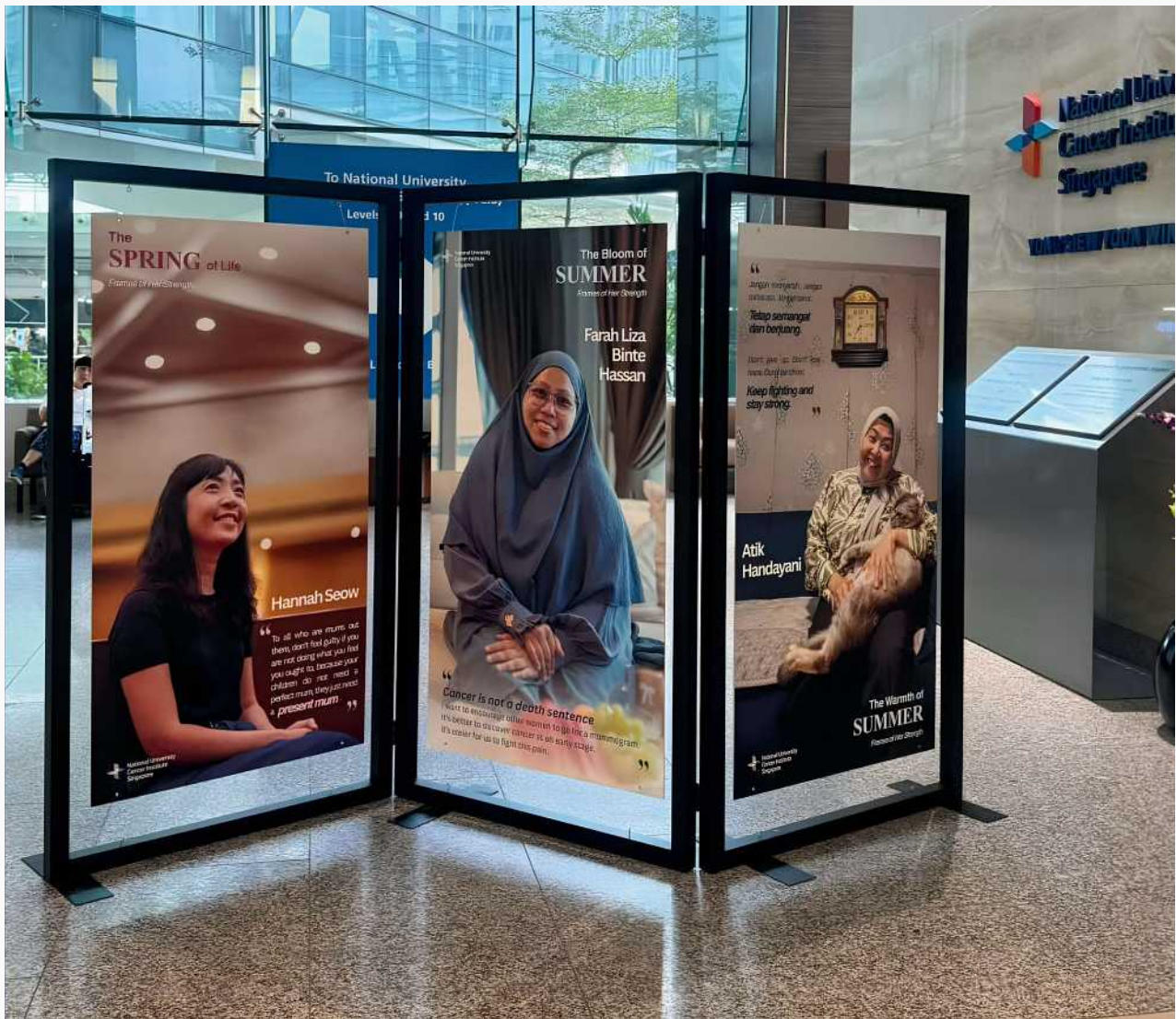
The programme featured a clinician sharing on

What unfolded that evening was quietly beautiful.

The family shared a meal together, exactly as Mr Lin had hoped for. For a man of few words, he expressed his gratitude in a way that moved everyone present. He was appreciative of every detail, every gesture, every moment.

Perhaps the most telling sign of all was his smile. Mr Lin, who rarely smiled in photographs or during visits from doctors, nurses, or even family, was photographed that evening with the widest smile on his face.
